The Species Status Advisory Committee (SSAC) was established in September 2003 under the Endangered Species Act to evaluate the status of species of provincial concern. At the time of this update, the SSAC had recommended listing of four vascular plant species evaluated at the federal level by the Committee on the Status of Endangered Wildlife in Canada (COSEWIC) and evaluated 17 additional vascular plant species; all of them were on the rare plant list in this report.

A recovery strategy for barrens willow (*Salix jejuna*) was completed in October 2003.
